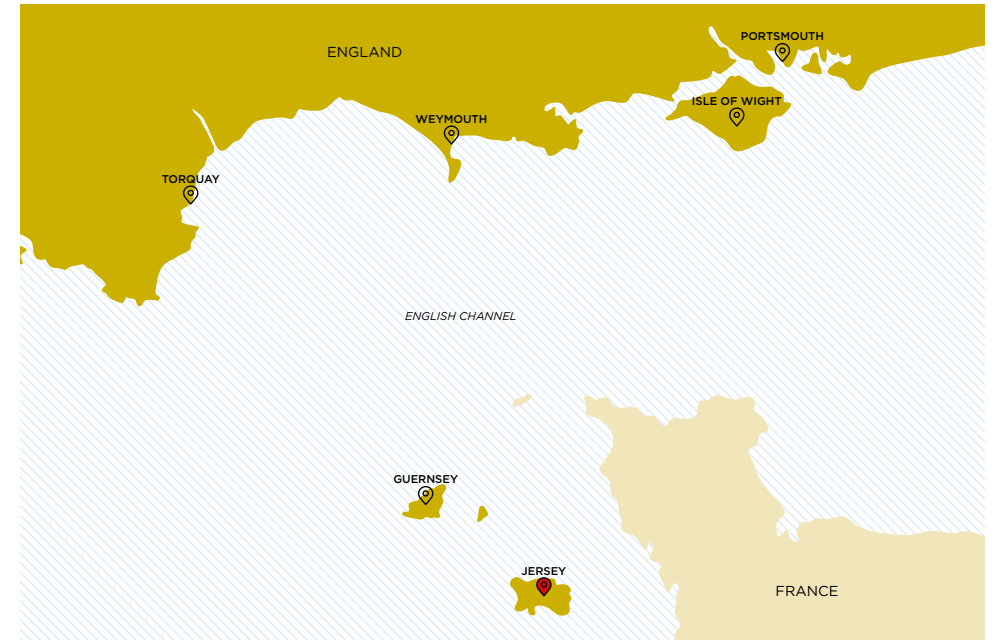


CHANNEL ISLANDS - JERSEY — DAY 1

Guests will join AMARYLLIS at anchor in St. Helier Bay and explore some of the island's attractions.

Jersey is the largest of the Channel Islands and is a self-governing dependency of the United Kingdom, with a mix of British and French cultures. The island is known for its beaches, cliffside walking trails, inland valleys and historic castles.

A historical highlight is the Jersey War Tunnels complex, which is a former hospital excavated by slave labor and documents the island's five (5) year German occupation during World War II.



CHANNEL ISLANDS - GUERNSEY — DAY 2

Today we shift from Jersey to Guernsey and take in the spectacular coastline over breakfast.

Guernsey is in the English Channel near the French coast, and is a self-governing British Crown dependency. It is known for beach resorts like Cobo Bay and the scenery of its coastal cliffs.

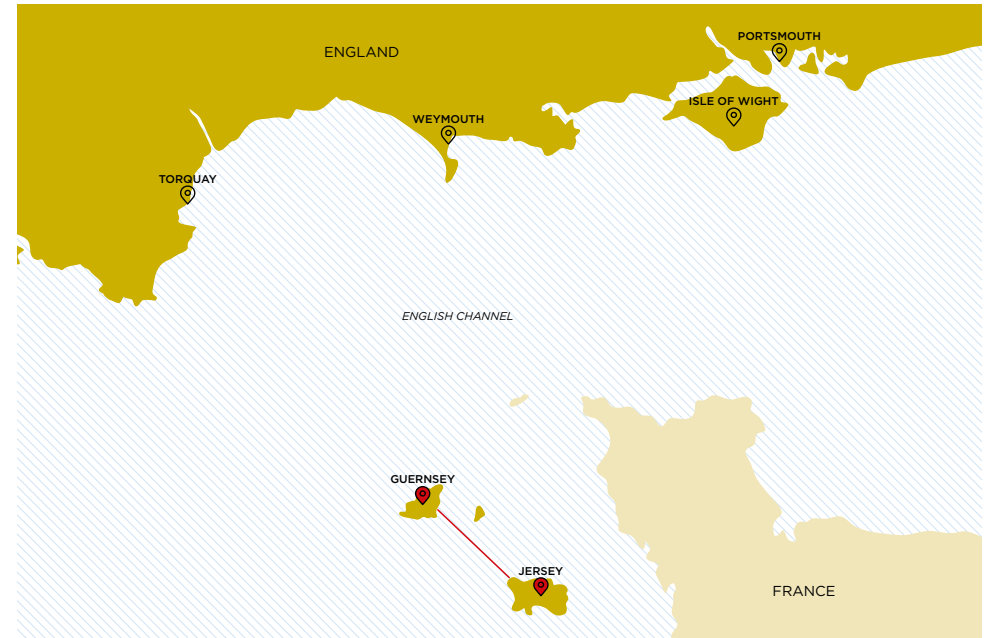
Castle Cornet, a 13th-century harbor fortification in the island's capital of St. Peter Port, now contains history and military museums. Hauteville House is the lavish former home of French writer, Victor Hugo.

SOUTHERN UNITED KINGDOM - TORBAY AND TORQUAY — DAY 3

After an overnight trip from Guernsey, we arrive in Torbay. This region is named the 'English Riviera' and consists of 22 miles of stunning coastline and charming coastal towns.

Torquay is located on the northern end of the bay and packed full of activities for young and old. Torquay's Living Coasts coastal zoo, features exciting indoor and outdoor exhibits including Penguin Beach, Fur Seal Cove and Octopus Odyssey.

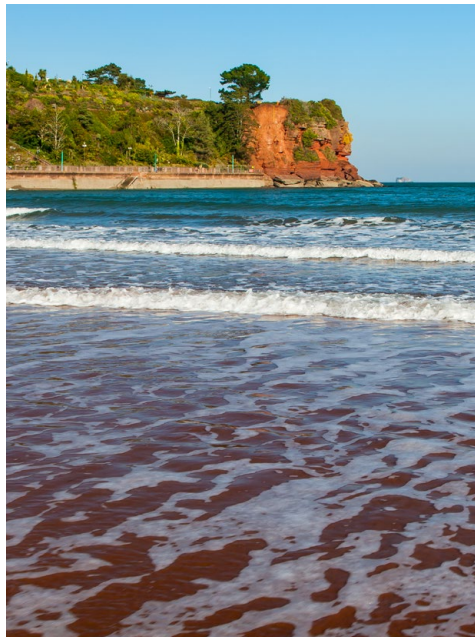
Close by is the Paignton Zoo, with over 3,000 animals from across the globe. It is also dedicated to conservation and preserving the area's natural heritage.

WEYMOUTH AND PORTLAND AREA; JURASSIC COAST BEACHES

DAY 4

After an early morning transit, we arrive in Weymouth. This area is famous for Chesil Beach and Jurassic Coast beaches, which are only a short trip across the bay. A vibrant city, Weymouth is a great place to explore; being able to anchor inside the breakwater for protection from the sea is a distinct advantage. Ten (10) miles from Weymouth is Abbotsbury, which is a haven of art galleries and wood workshops. Its main attraction is the subtropical gardens, a Victorian innovation that occupies a Grade I-listed woodland valley. Kids can interact with animals and race tractors at Abbotsbury Children's Farm.

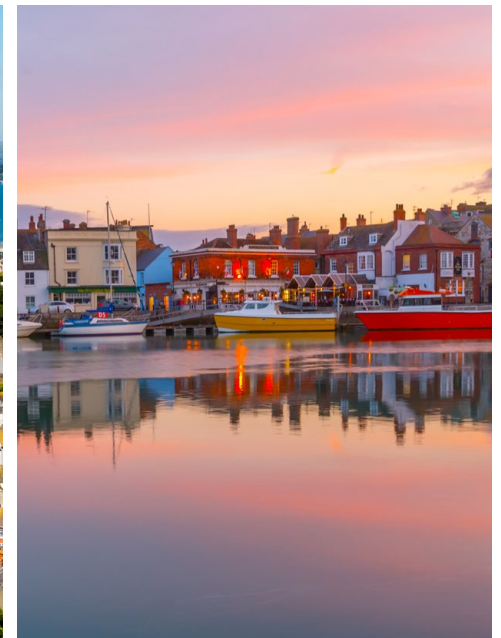
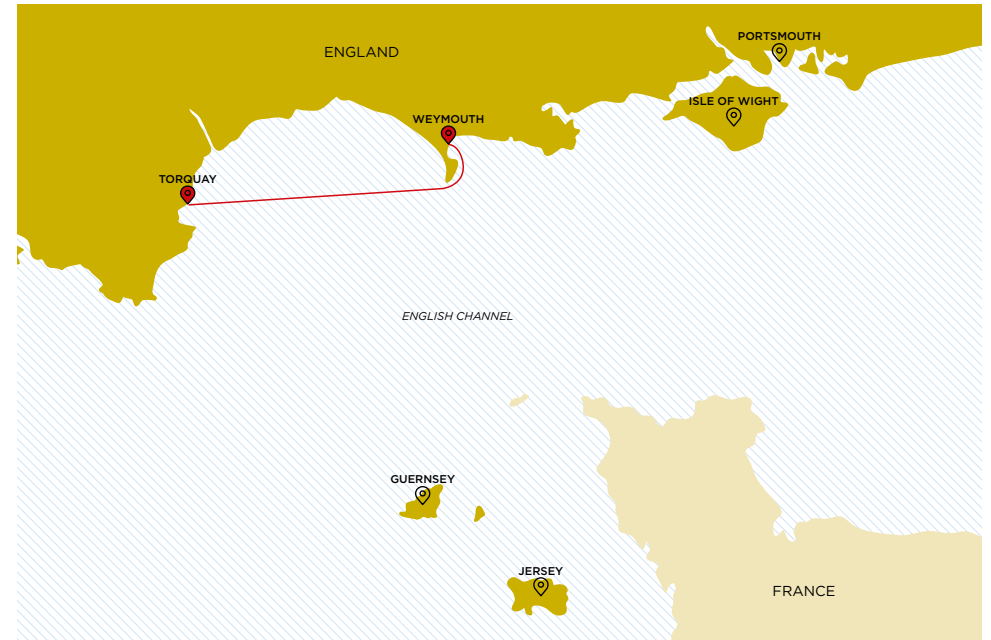
Built by Sir Walter Raleigh, the picturesque grounds of Sherborne Castle host the award winning Sherborne Castle Estate Vineyard. The vineyard produces its own brandy and approximately 12,000 bottles of high quality English wine from a range of grape varieties including pinot noir and baccus.

THE SOLENT - ISLE OF WIGHT — DAY 5

After a three (3) hour cruise along the Jurassic coast, we arrive in the Solent. The Solent is the strait that separates the Isle of Wight from the mainland of England. The Solent is a major shipping lane for passenger, freight and military vessels. It is also an important recreational area for water sports, particularly yachting, hosting the Cowes Week sailing event annually.

The Isle of Wight is known for its beaches and seafront promenades such as sandy Shanklin Beach and south-facing Ventnor Beach, which is dotted with vintage beach huts. Dinosaur remains and fossils are visible in areas like Compton Bay and Yaverland Beach.

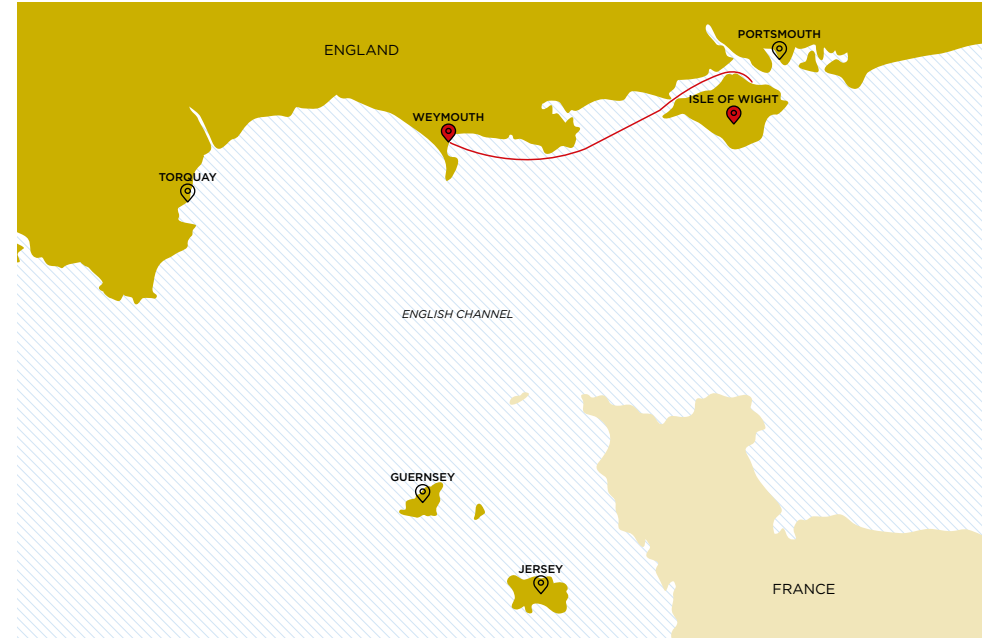
On the island's western point, The Needles are three (3) enormous, white chalk rocks, guarded by a 19th-century lighthouse. Carisbrooke Castle has been sitting in the middle of the Isle of Wight for 800 years and served in the past to protect the island from French invasion and the Spanish Armada.

PORTSMOUTH - GUNWHARF — DAY 6

We depart the anchorage in the Solent and cruise up to Portsmouth, where we will berth with the Gunwharf spinnaker tower as our backdrop. This is a vibrant port city and naval base spread across Portsea Island. It is known for its maritime heritage and the Portsmouth Historic Dockyard.

The Dockyard is home to the interactive National Museum of the Royal Navy and the wooden warships, HMS Victory and HMS Warrior. The HMS Victory was in the Battle of Trafalgar and Lord Nelson died on board during that fight.

Southsea has great family friendly activities including fairground, mini golf and beach tennis.

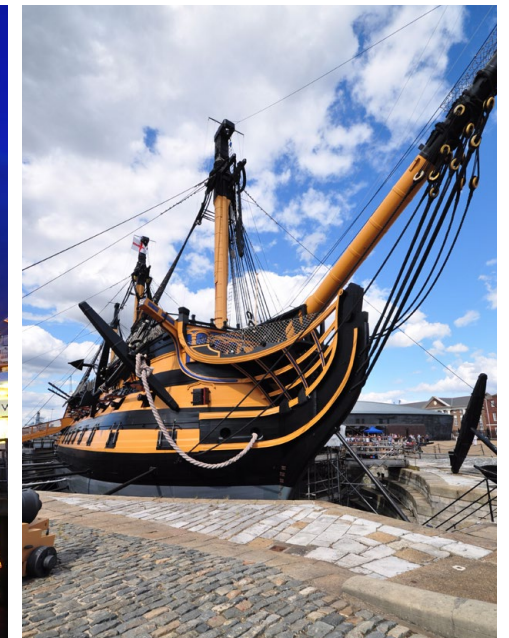
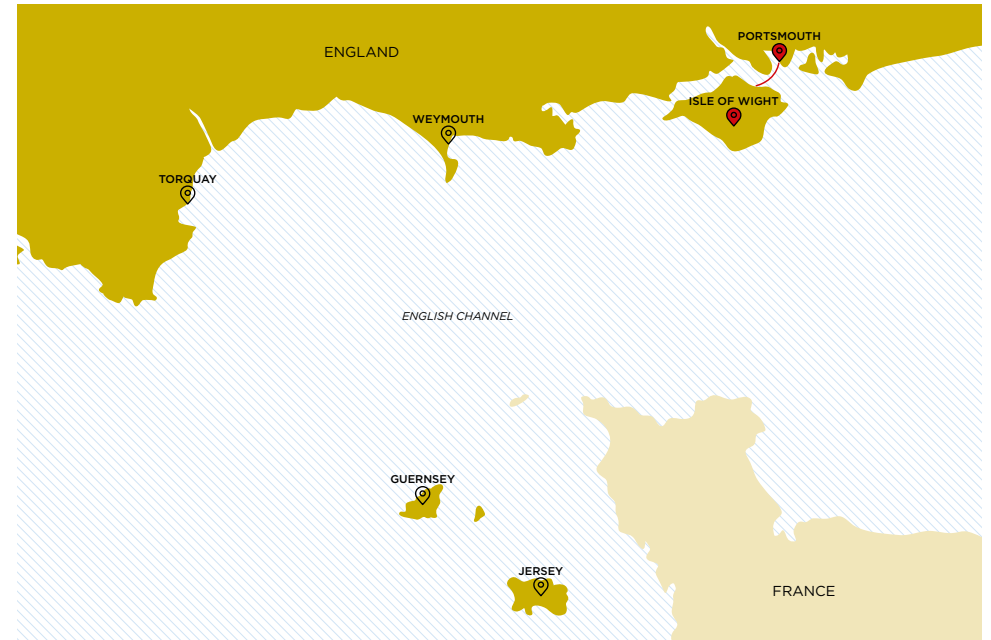
A selection of the area's Solent forts have been converted into luxury hotels and are worth a visit. We set sail from Portsmouth for an overnight trip to Guernsey.
